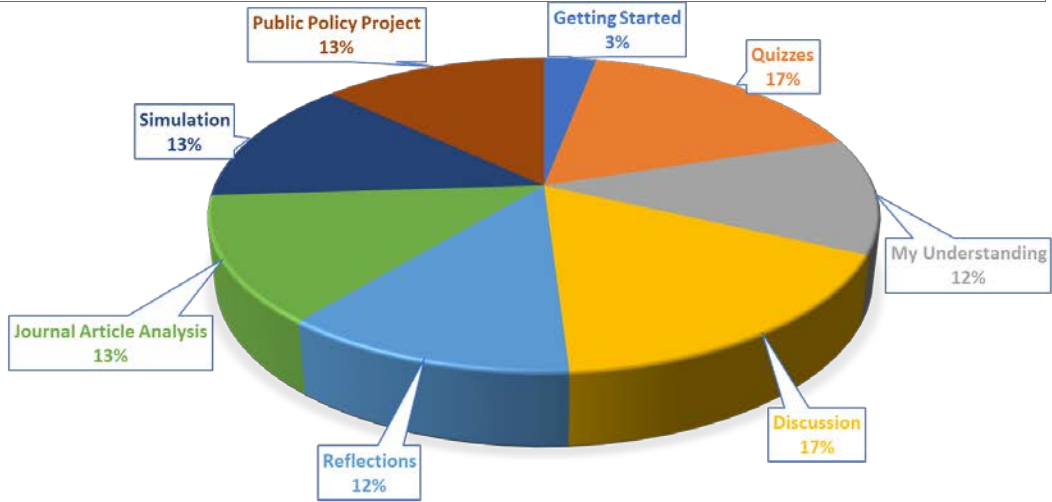

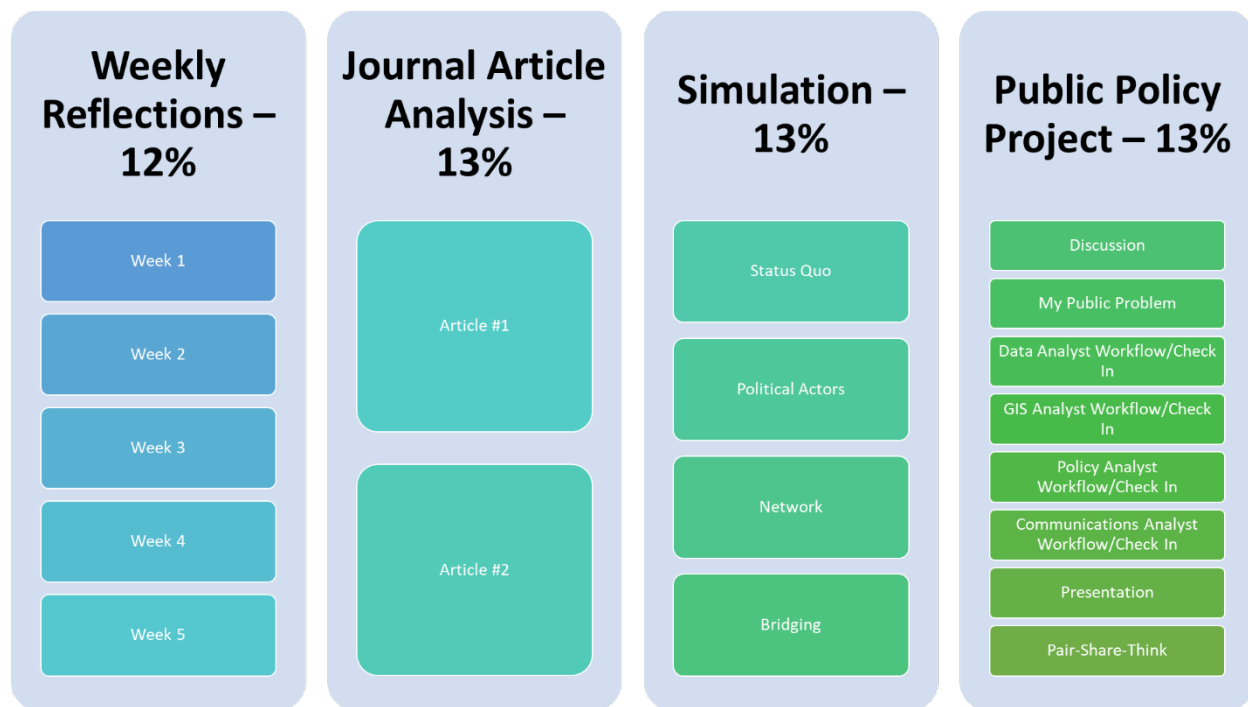

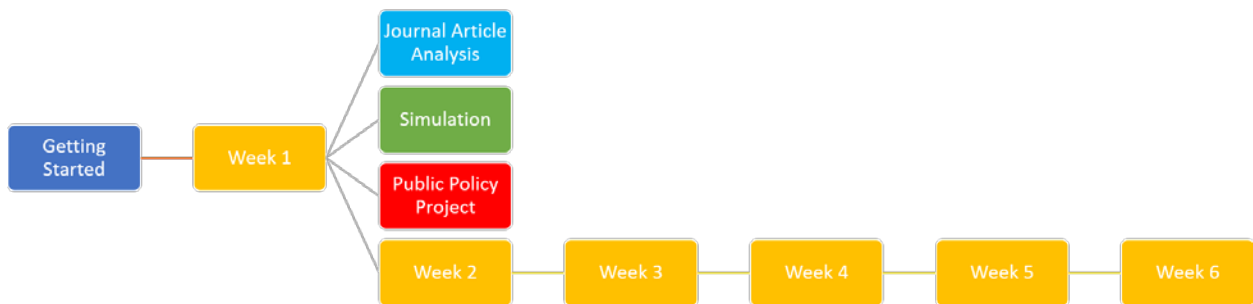
## POSC 130 - Summer 2019 - Setting Your Own Pace

Our course is based on **Learning Modules**. Modules are containers for course content and assignments. The figure below represents the sequences of modules for the course.



- Example #1: In order to start “Week 1” module, you need to Complete All Items in the “Getting Started” module
- Example #2: Completing all items in “Week 1” module is a prerequisite to access the “Journal Article Analysis”, “Simulation”, and “Public Policy Project” modules

Now, what this means is that you can set your own pace. I have due dates for Getting Started and Weeks 1-6 Learning Modules. However, there are no due dates for the assignments in the Journal Article Analysis, Simulation, and Public Policy Project modules.
